### 2023 General Rules

- 1. Most General projects will be judged on Saturday, July 15<sup>th</sup> in the Event Center. They will be judged <u>by project</u>, according to the interview-judging schedule. Check the General Project Schedule will be emailed to each participant. You should arrive about 10 minutes before your scheduled time. No one should arrive later than 10 minutes past their scheduled time to be judged. Judges will be released throughout the morning once their scheduled judging times have past.
- 2. Following judging, participants must take their project display area in Bldg I for fair display. Exhibitors who choose to use a poster as their exhibit must follow poster guidelines. Your educational display, poster size must be no larger than 22"x 28" on flat poster board, displayed horizontally. Do not use foam board, tri-fold or any poster board mounted on stiff backing unless the project section specifically requires tri-fold, etc. Shadow boxes, overlays, or three-dimensional posters are not permitted. Each poster must be clearly labeled in the lower right corner, in a space no larger than 3"x5" with the exhibitor's name, club, and project.
- 3. Clothing and Nutrition projects are judged THURSDAY, JULY 13<sup>th</sup> at the Event Center at the Warren County Fairgrounds. Details follow.
- 4. Following the fair, all General Project displays must be picked up from Bldg I on Sunday, July 23<sup>rd</sup> between 10 am and Noon.
- 5. All projects will need to complete a fair entry using FairEntry by June 15<sup>th</sup> at 4:30pm.

### **RULES AND GUIDELINES**

- 6. Participants are to provide a clean plastic garmentbag (clear dry cleaners bag) and white plastic coat hanger for each project.
- After the judging interview, exhibitors will put on their garments for group judging on the "Seven Clues" and creativity awards. Once judging is complete, exhibitors will place their garments back in a clear dry cleaning bag and leave outfits with Food and Fashion Board.
- 8. After the Style Revue, garments should be placed back in their plastic garment bags. Members of the Warren County Food & Fashion Board will transport the items for display immediately following the Style Revue. Placement ribbons and style revue pictures will be displayed with the garments.
- 9. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to pick-up their garments in Bldg I on Sunday, July 23<sup>rd</sup> between 10 am and noon.

- The food item to be judged should be representative of the types of foods in the project taken but does not have to be a recipe from the project book.
   NOTE: Taste is not a judging criterion.

### **RULES AND GUIDELINES**

   ½ x 11 inch white paper. Stories should be doublespaced. Poems should be single spaced. The
  entrant's full name, club, and class number should
  be included on the cover page.
- 2. Submit the entry in a 9 x 12 inch envelope to the Extension Office by July 6th. Clearly mark the entrant's name, club and class number on the upper left corner of the envelope. Do not place the entry in a folder prior to placing in the envelope. A staple or paperclip is sufficient to keep the pages together.
- Participants should be currently enrolled in a 4-H project #588 The Writer in You (classes 1 to 8) or #587 News Writing and Reporting for Teens (classes 9 and 10).
- 4. Each entry must be original and must have been written for a 4-H project, not as a school project orother contest entry.
- 5. All entries will be evaluated on the basis of title,

appeal, story-telling impact, creativity and transition.

6. An exhibitor may submit only one entry per class.
