Speaker: Sue Ellen Campbell

Sue Ellen Campbell will show you a variety of Ohio natives and how and why they can be used to enhance your landscape. She uses examples of plants that thrive in her personal gardens and attract birds, butterflies and bees. These plants are relatively low maintenance and generally provide long periods of color, texture and structure in the home garden. Whether your garden is a country landscape or an urban cityscape you can incorporate many of our Ohio native perennials with benefits to both people and wildlife.

About the Speaker:

Sue Ellen Campbell always has had a love of gardening, winning her first garden award in 5th grade. She became passionate about gardening upon her move to Ohio from Maine and retirement from nursing. Along with her husband, she has created a landscape around her home that won a 2005 Gardener Recognition Award from the Cincinnati Horticultural Society and has been featured in two Cincinnati magazines.

Sue Ellen became a Master Gardener in 2002 and remained active until 2014. Her focus is organic gardening with a desire to provide habitat to wildlife. She finds beauty in all seasons and tries to make it evident in her surroundings.

Pam is the co-author of the newly-published book Garden-pedia, An A-to- Z Guide to Gardening Terms, writes a weekly gardening column for the Springfield News and Sun and the Dayton Daily News, authors the bi-monthly Ask the Expert Column for Ohio Gardening magazine and is a frequent writer for popular gardening magazines as well as trade publications.

**How to have a Beautiful Garden
without Having an Ugly Shovel**

Gardening without a shovel simply means that nothing is planted in the ground. With our heavy clay soils in Southwestern Ohio, not only can this strategy be easier on your back, but it can also add many new and different design elements to your garden. Pat Stidham has been experimenting with this concept for many years and will share her gardens with you through pictures.

Gardening above the ground can also bring some unique challenges. Greg Meyer will provide some management tips to help you to be successful with above ground gardening, including information about container and raised bed gardening.

About the Speakers:

Pat Stidham has been gardening for 28 years and has been a Master Gardener in Warren County for two years. She has extensive perennial gardens at her home and her interest lies mainly in garden design.

Greg Meyer is the Agriculture Educator for Ohio State University Extension in Warren County. He started and coordinates the Master Gardener program in Warren County. Greg has been teaching gardening classes across the state for more than twenty years and has years of personal experience with container and raised bed vegetable gardening.
